16 INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:	This house faces west from the south-

east corner of South Main Street and Cottage Street. South Main Street displays a variety of building styles and uses. As one of the oldest structures in the area this house contributes historically to the mixture of buildings on South Main Street.

Five lights over doorway Six panel front door Later use of double overhang SIGNIFICANCE Builder: 18. HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This house was built for Rev. Stephen Parsons of the Strict or Separate (now South Congregational) Society of Middletown in 1788. The land was deeded to Rev. Parsons by Deacon Ebenezer Bacon on condition that Parsons remain as pastor for at least ten years, after which the property would become his own. In 1796, two years before that term was up, Parsons declared from the pulpit that he had converted to the Baptist faith, and his home reverted to the church for use as a parsonage. The church sold the property to Linus Burr in 1827, and it remained in the Burr family until 1939. The house has always been in residential use. With its two-room deep, center-chimney plan this house is typical of eighteenth century Connecticut house construction. The original doorway with five overlights is also a typical feature of the period.
