These modest Federal houses are reflective of the emerging middle class in early 19th century Middletown. They appear frequently in the 1830-1840 period, homes of mechanics, craftsmen, and farmers. To the west, a small, one and one-half story, Federal style dwelling and an 18th century center-chimney house complete a small coherent area of early residences, on Cross Street.
